NOTICE OF VIOLATION

This notice is to inform Kelley McMillan that the Napali Coast State Wilderness Park, Tax Map Key No: TMK 5-9-01, is owned by and under the jurisdiction of the State of Hawaii. Pursuant to the March 2014 issue of "Details" Magazine, you are the author of an article that indicated you lived at Kalalau, located in the Napali Coast State Wilderness Park, for a period of 10 days. This is a violation of Hawaii Administrative Rules 13-146-2 and the conditions of your permit.

The following Hawaii Administrative Rules (HAR) apply:

13-146-2 "Camping" means remaining within a designated camping area during closed hours or remaining within a state park while in possession of a sleeping bag, tent, tarpaulin, or other camping paraphernalia within the state park one hour after sunset until sunrise.

HAR §13-146-14 Camping, states that "no person shall camp or use recreational trailers or other camper units, except with the prior written authorization of the board or its authorized representative".

HAR section §13-146-34 Residence prohibited, states that "no person shall establish a temporary or permanent residence on the premises except with a permit or other written agreement with the board".

You were issued Special Use Permit (SUP K2013-092aa) and Overnight Permit (OP 2013-17011) from June 1, 2013 to June 2, 2013 for overnight media access to support your article. These permits were issued specifically to you by staff for a two day period that included the one overnight stay, at your request, because the camping area was filled at the established capacity.

Violation of these HAR sections is a petty misdemeanor that is subject to penalties and liabilities provided in Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS") section 184-5, and may also be subject to administrative fines and fees and costs pursuant to HRS section 184-5.5.

Pursuant to Chapter HRS 184-5.5, an administrative fine for a first violation may be up to a maximum of \$2,500.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that, by your own admission in the March 2014 edition of Details magazine, you have violated these rules and may be subject to penalties as provided for in Chapters 184-5 and 184-5.5
